



Less than half of residents of Freetown are willing to take a COVID vaccine while 36% are afraid to take imported doses from China.

With nearly 300,000 doses of COVID vaccines now available in Freetown, the epicenter for COVID infections in Sierra Leone, a SierraPoll survey conducted between 3rd and 5th March reveals that only 43% of the city's residents are

willing to take a COVID vaccine.






Vaccine awareness is higher among: men (58.1) than women (50%); West-end residents (71%) than East-end (54%); Christians (64%) than

Muslims (48%); and among older residents (above 56+yrs, 64%) than younger (18 to 35yrs, 53%).

In spite of high vaccine awareness in the West-end, fewer people there (33%) are willing to take the shots compared to East-end (54%) and Central Freetown (39%). Women (37.3%) are less willing than men (48.6%) to take the vaccine, while ruling party supporters (55.7%) are more willing to vaccinate compared to supporters of other parties. Overall, nearly 5 in 10 adults say they do not want to take a COVID vaccine.





Fear of vaccine side effects (44.9%) is the top reason for vaccine refusal. Second, over a third (35.7%) of respondents said they would not take the vaccine because they did not have COVID, conflating vaccination with cure. Third, nearly one year into the outbreak, one in four (24.9%) respondents still believe COVID is a hoax, and would refuse to take the vaccine for this reason.

If a vaccine was mandated, more respondents said they would prefer US-made vaccines (38%) compared to those from the UK (14.9%) and China (7.3%). Respondents were least likely to want vaccines from China (36.4%) or Nigeria (10.5%).

Respondents were asked what could help convince them to take vaccines. The president taking the vaccine was seen as most influential (28.1%) followed by family members (15.3%) and medical personnel (12.5%). Opposition leaders can also contribute to vaccination efforts.

Note: Sample size is 504; 50/50 male/female split. Margin of error is 4% with 95% confidence interval. Randomisation of respondent selection was done using a three stage process: a): random selection of 62 communities; b) random-walk for selection of 8 households per community; c) machine-based random selection of one respondent per household.
